
Our Learning Center will grow to welcome the next 10,000 teachers and offer an expanding range of online content.

A Historic Opportunity to Lift Up Liberty Written by: Dan Sanchez

Freedom has traveled a long and winding road, marked by spectacular leaps forward and horrifying reversals. After hundreds of millennia of stagnation, the triumph of classical liberalism and the market society in the 18th and 19th centuries showed what humanity can accomplish when its boundless capacity for cooperation and creativity is unleashed.

But then tragedy struck. In the 20th century, totalitarian ideologies like communism and fascism hijacked the technological wonders made possible by capitalism to perpetrate atrocities on an industrial scale. Even western Europe fell prey to the rising tide of statism. And America all but forgot its founding philosophy of freedom.

It was then, at liberalism's lowest point, that Leonard Read, Henry Hazlitt, and other allies launched the Foundation for Economic Education to rekindle the light of liberty. In the decades since, a new liberty movement has grown and gained steam. Now, in the 21st century, the ideas of liberty are once again circulating throughout the world and winning hearts and minds in large numbers.

As a result, liberal civilization's winding road has reached a fork.

Recent statist overreach has provoked a widespread rejection of big-government responses to the modern world's problems and opportunities. The state's stranglehold on institutions—mass media, education, "the science," culture, etc.—suddenly tightened but then rapidly weakened with the techenabled triumph of alternative platforms and voices.

Most recently a seismic "vibe shift" has rattled the deep state to its core. The prospect of slashing the size of government and its vast network of restrictions has gone from a distant dream to an immediate possibility. Public opinion concerning the roles of government and the individual is more fluid than it has been in decades, maybe centuries.

But this dynamism is a double-edged sword. Unlike America's founding revolution, the current populist reaction against tyrannical institutions is not informed by an intellectually rigorous, philosophically coherent, and ethically grounded philosophy of freedom. This can be seen in the populist embrace of protectionism and the economic fallacies that underpin it, as well as other illiberal and potentially tyrannical undercurrents in "anti-leftist" circles. Such deviations from liberty and free markets threaten to negate the fruits of positive changes and, in the long term, discredit freedom in the eyes of the public.

At this crucial juncture in human history, the public needs liberty education and leadership more urgently than ever. As the censorship regime lifts and the public appetite for change rises, we have a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity to steer that change in the right direction by swaying intellectual discourse and the ideals of the rising generation with the philosophy of freedom.

That means becoming more adept and savvy with our messaging strategies. But, in order to provide thought leadership to society at large, we must also better cultivate strong thought leaders within our own ranks. We must train not just persuasive policy polemicists, but principled and inspiring figures who deeply understand, rigorously uphold, and masterfully communicate the philosophy of freedom. In recent years, the liberty movement has emphasized the former and neglected the latter. The liberty pipeline is broken. We must do more to pave pathways and provide guides to help liberty lovers graduate into liberty leaders.

Now, the Foundation for Economic Education, under the leadership of our president Diogo Costa, is undertaking an ambitious project filled with promise: to build a new Liberty Pipeline. In doing so, FEE is at the same time returning to its roots and reaching for the sky. We are continuing to expand our ability to reach and persuade young people in large numbers through media and the classroom. But we are also building out opportunities for such converts to grow in their understanding and ability to communicate the ideas of liberty. We are doing this by reviving FEE's grand tradition—embodied in its renowned seminars and publications—as an educational seedbed for cultivating the liberty thought leaders of the future. And we are updating that tradition by fully utilizing bleeding edge advances in teaching techniques and technologies.

The Liberty Pipeline, explained in greater detail in the following pages, will seed both the grassroots and leadership of a liberty movement that can steer today's broader push for change away from perilous pitfalls and toward a shining future of freedom and flourishing.

FEE's Theory of Change

FEE's theory of change blends enduring principles of societal transformation with modern tools to magnify impact. Drawing from Friedrich Hayek's idea of "intellectual multipliers"—those who spread and reshape ideas—it evolves through Leonard Read's focus on cultivating excellence within close-knit communities. Targeting individuals in their formative years, as noted by Andrew Gelman, FEE amplifies this approach with technology to expand and deepen influence. The goal: to inspire a cultural shift toward freedom, sparking a ripple effect that shapes beliefs, values, and future leadership. This multidimensional, evidence-based strategy ensures FEE preserves its legacy while advancing liberty in new ways.





1. Hayek's Vision: The Multiplication of Ideas

At the heart of Hayek's insight is the concept of "Second-Hand Dealers of Ideas"—those who are not originators of ideas but play a vital role in spreading them. Historically, these intellectual multipliers were journalists, professionals, and community leaders who shaped public understanding through their influence. Today, their modern counterparts include content creators, influencers, and thought leaders who operate within specialized domains.

2. Read's Strategy: Community and Excellence

Read taught that lasting change flows from small, committed groups—seen in both revolutionary movements and modern innovation hubs. In these communities, ideas sharpen through collaboration, influence grows through shared networks, and accountability drives excellence. Leadership in this setting calls for deep understanding, confident conviction, and the ability to inspire others to carry the mission forward. Through this model, individual growth scales into broad societal renewal.





3. Gelman's Window: Targeting Formative Years

Andrew Gelman's research highlights a critical window for shaping beliefs: between the ages of 14 and 24. During these formative years, individuals are most impressionable, often adopting ideas that endure throughout their lives. Beliefs formed during this period are three times more likely to persist, creating a foundation for lasting cultural and societal transformation.

4. Technology: Tools for Timeless Ideas

Digital innovation has unleashed a new era of opportunity—one that Havek and Read could scarcely have imagined. Today, powerful ideas can cross continents in seconds, fueled by social media, digital platforms, and content networks that erase the old barriers of cost and distance. Technology not only amplifies reach; it transforms strategy. It acts as a dynamic filter, surfacing the individuals most capable of shaping the future. By harnessing these tools, FEE is identifying emerging leaders, delivering transformative experiences tailored to their potential, and forging a new generation deeply committed to the principles of freedom.

FEE's unified theory of change aims to spark a cultural shift toward freedom by empowering the multipliers of ideas, building interconnected communities of excellence, targeting the formative years of belief formation, and leveraging technology to amplify impact. Through our new Liberty Pipeline, we seek to reshape the intellectual landscape itself, cultivate lasting influence, and scale a movement for generations to come.

FEE's Liberty Pipeline

The Liberty Pipeline being built by FEE, described in detail in the pages that follow, is deeply informed by our theory of change presented on the previous pages. We are casting a wide net to draw into our pipeline the Remnant of the rising generation: young minds that resonate with the ideas of liberty. 
FEE is leveraging advancements in AI to build a cutting-edge digital learning environment that encourages young people to interact with the freedom philosophy.

What We Believe

A Manifesto

Founded in 1946, our mission at the Foundation for Economic Education is to inspire and educate future leaders about the principles that underpin a free society. We believe in individual liberty, free-market economics, entrepreneurship, private property, high moral character, and limited government. At the same time, we recognize the challenges of the modern world and strive to apply these principles in fresh, innovative ways.

We

believe that the ultimate purpose of any political or economic system should be to enable individuals to live free and flourishing lives. Laws must apply equally to everyone. All people—regardless of race, gender, religion, or background—share the same rights to life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness. No one should be coerced into a specific lifestyle. Instead, individuals should have the freedom to choose their own path and peacefully share their beliefs and values with others.

To foster human flourishing and overcome poverty, societies must rest on a foundation of individual rights, private property, and the rule of law. Property rights should be clearly defined and protected—not just for the wealthy and powerful, but especially for the most vulnerable. When property is insecure, the poor and the weak suffer the most. Their hard-earned possessions can be arbitrarily taken, and their livelihoods are left at the mercy of the powerful.

We envision a future where abundance is the norm, and the marvels of technology and industry are accessible to everyone, regardless of their circumstances. Entrepreneurship and free markets are transformative forces for social integration and upward mobility. Through building and growing businesses, individuals born into poverty should be able to rise as far as their talents and ambition allow. In a free and open economy, success is earned not through political favors or inherited privileges, but by serving others and creating value. Far from being a system of exploitation, entrepreneurial capitalism is humanity's greatest engine for empowerment and prosperity.

Prices and profits, shaped by the dynamic interplay of supply and demand, provide essential knowledge that enables individuals to coordinate their efforts. The market process depends on insight, merit, achievement, courage, and individual agency. It should be embraced and respected, not manipulated or overridden by central planners. Markets require a foundation of sound institutions, such as stable money and impartial courts. The role of modern liberal democracies is to establish just rules of the game while letting the market process determine outcomes freely.

While the scope of government should be strictly limited, the quality of its institutions is not fixed or beyond improvement. Modern democracies face several key obstacles: special interests extracting wealth without creating value (rent-seeking), gridlock caused by groups blocking needed reforms (vetocracy), aging and inefficient legal systems that prevent reform (technical debt or kludgeocracy), and bureaucracies that grow increasingly rigid and unresponsive over time (institutional sclerosis). By fixing these problems, we can create institutions that are more effective, accountable, and responsive—ultimately expanding human freedom and delivering significant benefits to society.

We recognize the "crisis of authority" confronting traditional institutions in the digital age. While declining public trust in elite knowledge poses challenges, it also create opportunities for a revival of bottom-up problem-solving. The solution is not to tear down institutions at random, but to reimagine and rebuild them with purpose.

The spread of power and information opens paths to new governance tools and models. With the help of technology, communities can manage resources and solve conflicts without relying on coercion.

Classical liberals and libertarians value social harmony without demanding consensus. A healthy society thrives on diversity of beliefs, spirited debate, and the constant testing of ideas. Every person must be free to speak his mind, challenge prevailing wisdom, and engage with opposing views without intimidation. Institutional stability depends on epistemological openness: granting any faction the power to silence others makes winning elections existentially high-stakes, as victors can use censorship to lock opponents out of public debate. The only limit to free inquiry and speech should be direct incitement to violence, which violates the fundamental rights to life. liberty and property. In every other domain, the clash of competing ideas sharpens our understanding. Even false claims strengthen our grasp of truth by compelling us to refine and defend sound arguments.

Policy Challenges

In applying these principles to the realm of government policy, we prioritize prudence and practical reasoning over dogma. Public policies, even when justified, should be assessed based on their costs and benefits, not merely their intentions. In general, we favor bottom-up solutions that are tailored to local needs rather than centralized, one-size-fits-all approaches. Those closest to the problem understand its complexities best, and solutions that enhance individual agency produce better outcomes than distant bureaucratic control. Efforts to address poverty, for instance, should empower individuals to make their own choices and build self-reliance, rather than expanding state control.

Exploring innovations—cultural, institutional, and technological—that deliver public goods through voluntary means, rather than coercive taxation, reflects our commitment to a freer society. We recognize that externalities, where the costs or benefits of an activity spill over onto third parties, pose genuine social and environmental challenges. Strong property rights, however, often provide the best mechanism for addressing these spillovers. Well-defined property rights enable Coasean bargaining, allowing affected parties to reach efficient and fair solutions. When traditional property rights fall short, pricing externalities—such as greenhouse gas emissions—can internalize social costs while creating new, tradable property rights.

Yet

many market solutions to environmental and social challenges face a significant obstacle: excessive regulation. Regulatory barriers often hinder progress in cleaner energy, affordable housing, and infrastructure. Narrow NIMBY interests frequently block beneficial projects, leaving cities less vibrant, more polluted, and increasingly unaffordable. By streamlining approvals and limiting excessive litigation, we can empower markets to drive environmental progress and improve quality of life.

We reject the pessimism that growth is unsustainable due to environmental constraints. Time and again, human creativity and innovation has solved challenges once thought impossible. The prophets of degrowth have consistently been proven wrong. In a free society, innovation and stewardship can overcome even significant environmental challenges. The solution to environmental problems is not less growth, but smarter growth—powered by the unrelenting human drive to improve our condition. Human ingenuity is the ultimate resource.

Internationally, we advocate for a freer movement of goods, people, and ideas. We believe humanity is one, and that the accidents of birthplace and citizenship should not determine anyone's life chances. Migration must be managed responsibly, but peaceful people seeking opportunity should face fewer barriers. We likewise support trade as a positive-sum way to connect the world's producers and consumers. Global trade is not a race to the bottom, but a stairway to the stars.

At the same time, we recognize the geopolitical dangers that surround us. A stable and prosperous world depends on a secure and peaceful international order, for war is the ultimate enemy of human life and human freedom. It is in times of peace that economies flourish, technologies advance, and the human spirit soars to its greatest heights. It is the strength of free nations that deters aggression and preserves the blessings of human civilization. Strong and peaceful market democracies are a force for good.

We believe in human progress driven by science, technology, and entrepreneurial innovation. Governments must adapt to change rather than impose rigid regulations and barriers to progress. The tools emerging today—from clean energy and life extension to startup societies, artificial intelligence, and cryptocurrency—can transform human capabilities. With sound frameworks, these advances will make humanity healthier, wealthier, and wiser. A world of abundance lies within reach: one where material needs are met at negligible cost, energy flows freely, and most diseases yield to human ingenuity. This future demands entrepreneurial vision and the determination to build it.

The Beauty of Freedom

For an innovative society to thrive, it must also be a free and open society—one characterized by free inquiry, pluralism, peace and tolerance. Tyrannies can also harness innovation for their own ends. Only decentralized intelligence, entrepreneurial dynamism, respect for the rule of law, and limits on power can unlock technology's true potential to advance human flourishing.

Furthermore, abundance without freedom is but a gilded cage. Material prosperity, while necessary, is not sufficient for human thriving. For what is a rich life, if one is not free to think, to speak, to worship, to love, to create, to pursue one's dreams without limits? Freedom of expression, freedom of belief, freedom of association, freedom to choose one's own path—these are not mere luxuries but the very lifeblood of the human experience.

We utterly reject the pernicious notion that liberty must be traded off against other social values like security, equality or stability. On the contrary, freedom properly understood is the wellspring from which all other blessings flow. It is the crucible of creativity, the guardian of human dignity, the catalyst of social dynamism. In its absence, the human spirit withers. In its presence, it soars to unimaginable heights.

Ours is an unabashedly individualist creed, one that puts the sanctity of the person at the very center. We believe in the inviolability of self-ownership, in the inalienable right of every man and woman to be the protagonists of their own lives and destinies. And we believe that a truly free society is one in which the only limit on the individual is the equal freedom of others—where persuasion replaces coercion, and all relations are based on mutual consent.

But individualism need not mean atomism. For in a free and open society, the flowering of human diversity and differentiation creates a beautiful web of interdependence, a marvelous fabric of voluntary cooperation and exchange. The market, far from a sterile machine, is an organic social ecosystem—a space where individuals, each pursuing their own

vision of the good life, create value for one another and weave together ever more prosocial forms of community.

Thus, we believe that societies are rich emergent orders whose health depends on myriad institutions: families and community groups, companies and associations, universities and houses of worship. Classical liberal politics is about enabling these elements of civil society to solve problems collaboratively, not replacing them with state power. We aim for a world of abundant options, competition, and individual choice. Our ultimate goal is nothing less than a universal civilization of free people engaging in peaceful cooperation and voluntary exchange under just rules. We have made immense strides in this direction, but there is so much further to go. We aspire to build a world of ambition, abundance and adventure for our children.

The challenges facing liberal civilization are immense: from authoritarian states abroad to populist movements at home, from fiscal overstretch to cultural decay. At every turn, the enemies of freedom seek to supplant the spontaneous order of catallaxy with the dead hand of the state. Our enemies are stagnation, central planning, thought and speech control.

In response, we must reinvent classical liberalism for a new era—not as a relic, but as humanity's boldest path forward. This is the mission to which we dedicate ourselves as new classical liberals and libertarians. 
